28	DECLARATION OF PLAINTIFF NOAH C. IN SUPPORT OF
20	PLAINTIFFS' OPPOSITION TO DEFENDANTS' MOTION TO DISMISS

I, Noah C., hereby declare and if called upon would testify as follows:

- 1. I am a Plaintiff in the above-entitled action. I make this Declaration in support of Plaintiffs' Opposition to Defendants' Motion to Dismiss. I have personal knowledge of the facts stated herein, and if called to testify, I would and could testify competently thereto.
- 2. During our first court hearing in our case it was suggested to us that we could do lobbying and volunteering to make a difference. Having to lobby and volunteer avoids the very thing we are trying to do with this lawsuit—which is to protect our constitutional rights to be treated fairly. It is upsetting to have the main question we are asking to be resolved avoided: Do we have equal rights that must be protected despite what the political figureheads in power decide?
- 3. I am 15 years old and cannot vote. Despite my inability to vote, during my childhood since I was 9 years old, I have tried to do what the Court suggested to us—to advocate for policies that address climate change and its effects. I have been involved doing lobbying with an organization, Schools for Climate Action, that helps students engage with the government to address climate change. During the pandemic when I was going into sixth grade, I also lobbied for a Congressional Resolution, S.Con.Res.13/H.Con.Res., recognizing children's fundamental rights and climate recovery.
- 4. In their First Motion to Dismiss, Defendants stated the Court should not hear my case because these constitutional issues should be brought to the political branches of government. Yet I have brought these issues to the attention of Congress for several years. Students, including myself, have been telling our stories to Congress for years, yet we have not been heard

- and our rights are not being protected because the government keeps pursuing policies that make climate change worse and treat me and other children unfairly, like the ones involved in our case.
- 5. In 2020, when I was around 9 years old, I participated in my first lobbying experience over Zoom to members of Congress. During one call, I felt like no one was listening to us, which made me cry and I had to leave the room to calm down.
- 6. Last year, in 2023, along with other students, I went out to Washington, D.C. to meet with members of Congress from both political parties to try to convince them to pass two resolutions, including a non-binding resolution stating that the climate crisis was harming youth mental health. This issue affects me personally because, as I put in our Amended Complaint, I have mental health struggles that have been caused by and are worsened by climate anxiety. Our group visited the offices of different representatives. This experience was extremely frustrating to me because several of these members of Congress treated us like a brief calendar item in their scheduled day that they had to endure and conclude as soon as possible. No meaningful climate change policies, or even non-binding resolutions, resulted from our work in Washington, D.C.
- 7. Despite hearing the stories of other students and me, very few members of Congress signed on to the non-binding resolution. The unwillingness of these members of Congress to listen to young people like me is extremely discouraging. Lobbying takes an emotional toll on me, to see firsthand that politicians won't do anything to stop what is happening to us, and it's disappointing when nothing comes from our efforts. When these members of Congress refuse to really listen to me, unlike an adult, I have no way to

- vote them out of office. To protect my mental health, I have turned to other outlets outside of the political process to combat climate change, like choosing to be a Plaintiff in this action to stand up for my rights where I actually have a chance to be heard.
- 8. Though being shut out of the political process is discouraging, and having no right to legally participate in voting, I know my rights can still be protected through the courts, which is why I joined in filing this case.
- 9. In my experience, adults don't listen to children as much as they listen to other adults because they think we aren't mature enough to know what's going on in the world and what should be done. I have experienced getting the "pat on the head" and then shoved aside by politicians in favor of other priorities. We, as children, are not treated equally in our government's policies. EPA makes decisions about pollution based on who is in power and not based on science or what is best for children.
- 10. Watching big political figures make decisions about pollution and the world that I have no control over because I can't vote increases my climate anxiety. I would jump for joy if EPA was required to recognize us as a group of people with valid and equal concerns. It would make me less anxious about my future. We would have equal representation if we were listened to and taken into account fairly.
- 11. I don't want to have to keep lobbying Congress for my health and my future and if the court helped protect our rights, I wouldn't have to spend my childhood doing that. But it would also be a lot less stressful to go and lobby if our rights were protected through our lawsuit because the politicians I've lobbied in front of are made up of a lot of older men who

- weren't interested in what we have to say. If they had to listen because our rights were protected, it would make a big difference.
- 12. If I didn't need to worry about my government's treatment of us and climate pollution, I would be less anxious and do the things I love to do with my family and friends and in nature. It would also be easier to focus on school. It is very difficult to sit in Algebra class one minute and have my rights ignored and the climate crisis worsen the next.
- All of the facts I stated in the Amended Complaint about my injuries are true.
- 14. I understand that the Court cannot, on its own, solve the entire climate crisis. But if the Court at least tells EPA that it cannot discriminate against me and other young people, that will make a significant difference, and give us a chance at a life will less harm.
