And then they decided they should make their way to the ponds. Afterall, once they lay their eggs, there will be more of them to play hide ‘n seek with next year.



“Sally, look! The humans closed the road.”


“No more cars or trucks. We can cross the street safely!”

Shouted Sally happily.






As they crossed the road they sang a song.

...but keep partying.


Meet Jeff & Sally's Babies.

Conserving Our Rural Ecosystems of Burlington (CORE Burlington) is a group of neighbours who work together to protect the ecological integrity of our slice of the **Niagara Escarpment**. There's only a few places Jefferson salamanders live, so it's important that we protect their critical habitat.

We're doing everything we can, but we would love your help, too! **It's everyone's job to help to protect the plants and animals that call Burlington and the Niagara Escarpment home.** Some of these species are really sensitive to disruptions in their habitat, and the **Jefferson salamander** is particularly vulnerable to changes in their environment.
