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about love and leaving a legacy. I want to honor these heroes of mine by demonstrating how they have influenced my thoughts, words, and actions. In this work, my children and other readers will come to know and feel the impact of the prominent people who have shown me what it means to love unconditionally and sacrificially. May it serve as an inspiration—after all, helping others is the core of living a good life.

DON'T MESS TEXAS

"Of all the branches of men in the forces there is none which shows more devotion and faces grimmer perils than the submariners."

"This isn't good," I whispered to my executive officer as a sub-hunting aircraft flew directly overhead, taking up the full view of our 377-foot fast-attack nuclear submarine's periscope.

I swallowed hard and felt my pulse quicken, but I knew I needed to project a calm and steady presence. I managed to order "DOWN SCOPE!" in a swift, loud voice.

As we waited, listening with our highly sensitive sonar for additional flyovers, I looked around the silent room at the thirty sets of eyes trained on me. I could feel my crew's fear and apprehension as they awaited my direction.

Some of the faces that stared back were old and weathered, but many were the fresh faces of young men who had joined the navy straight out of high school. They hailed from states across the nation, including our ship's namesake, Texas. My sailors were the best our country had to offer. I thought about their fathers and mothers who had entrusted me with their care.

Our two-billion-dollar, Virginia-class submarine was on a classified mission in unfriendly waters thousands of miles from her home port of

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Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Our task was to gather information about the area, collect special signals of interest, and observe our adversary conduct a certain secret event. The mission required gliding unseen beneath the surface in close proximity to numerous formidable combatants. It was a tall but achievable order for a ship with the motto "Don't mess with *Texas*!"

During the operation, we had deviated from the standard protocol of a continuous 360-degree periscope sweep, opting instead to direct the periscope's limited restricted field of vision toward our adversary's activities in anticipation of the imminent event. I had based this decision on the examples set by previous commanding officers during similar high-stakes missions, and I considered the departure from normal procedure an acceptable risk.

But when I detected a subtle, audible shift in the radar noises emanating from the speaker in the control room, I ordered my officer of the deck to do a 360-rotational view with the periscope, then focused on the dozens of electronic boards surrounding me. That was when the enemy aircraft filled our screen.

If we were spotted, our adversary would likely box us in and force an emergency surface, spelling the end of our critical mission and causing public scrutiny and embarrassment of our fleet and, more broadly, our government. Counter-detection could even jeopardize the safety of our ship and, worst of all, my crew.

As we waited below the murky waters, listening for sounds of the plane's return, my mind raced and my pulse boomed in my ears. Timing was critical to our mission. In fact, I wondered if we'd already missed the event we were there to observe. With our periscope down, it was impossible to know.

It felt like an eternity, but after a few minutes ticked by with no indication that the aircraft had circled back, I ordered the scope to be raised again.

Tension filled the air as my operations officer studied his surveillance equipment in the adjacent room. His deep voice suddenly broke the silence as he broadcast a pre-rehearsed counter-detection alert: "Control, this is the operations officer. FIRECRACKER! FIRECRACKER!"

It was what I had been dreading. I knew that to avoid catastrophe, it was time to take evasive measures, though I was reluctant to fail at our critical mission with its large price tag. For a moment, I considered that my operations officer might be wrong and that our adversary had detected something other than our ship. But the chances of such a coincidence seemed near zero.

My gut told me they had us and we needed to act. I knew exactly what to say. I had played this scenario out in my head many times and rehearsed the order: "Make your depth four hundred feet. All ahead standard. Left full rudder. This is the captain. I have the conn."

But before I articulated the words, my XO, Gary Montalvo, anticipated my intention and stopped me. Stepping in front of me, he held up his hand and said in a voice loud enough for all to hear, "Captain, Captain, wait! We're already screwed; let's see if we are pregnant."

Gary knew that my decision to deviate from standard procedure made me anxious to ensure the safety of the crew. While he thought there was a good chance that we had been counter-detected, he also saw what the guilt of my recent decision caused me to miss—the extended time it took for the aircraft to circle back was odd and gave us reason to hope that we had *not* been seen. We might not be "pregnant" after all.

Gary didn't want to flinch without just cause. He knew the decision I was about to make would be irreversible and mean mission failure. My actions would be critiqued by high-ranking officials, and if subsequent analysis showed that we had not been counter-detected, my decision would be used as a textbook example of what not to do on a mission.

In order to protect me, Gary put his own credibility on the line and openly challenged my authority. Since we had a long-established relationship of trust and respect, there was no part of me that doubted he spoke out of love, loyalty, and concern for me and the crew. So, I listened while Gary explained his thoughts.

Still, I was uneasy with the idea of delaying, and the weight of the seemingly no-win situation pressed down upon me.

Then, another sailor spoke up. "Maybe it wasn't us the aircraft detected. Something doesn't make sense."

Several others began to chime in.

As they spoke, I became convinced; my original assessment of the situation didn't feel right. I finally agreed: "Let's see if we are pregnant."

We stayed put—which was far more stressful than running. We felt conspicuous and vulnerable in our steel capsule, all the time expecting our adversary to react. But they continued their operation as if unaware of our presence. It seemed my XO had been right.

At the conclusion of the event, we returned to our home port, riding high on the accomplishment of a successfully completed mission vital to national security.

But what had given Gary the courage to risk speaking up? In short, mutual trust and understanding. He knew that I would listen to what he had to say rather than punish him because I knew he would only speak out of the best of intentions. We had each other's backs. We shared a sense of purpose, foundational principles, and a relentless drive for excellence. Gary and the other members of my crew protected each other like family. We'd

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built a high-functioning culture that allowed us to achieve success even in great moments of crisis. Our culture was legendary.

In this book, I will provide tools you can implement with your own teams. Research shows that leadership *can* be taught.¹ If you use the basic principle of familial love as the core of your mission, you can build a legendary culture. I will offer many examples of how caring for my team members led to success and extraordinary results.

Of course, love alone isn't enough. I will also explain how trust, standards, purpose, and accountability all play a role. Individually, these foundational principles cannot yield success; they need each other to flourish. Building a culture with all of them is in itself an act of love.

Though I focus on stories of success, I believe it's important to reflect on times of failure and poor examples of leadership as well. I have come to realize my failures happened when I lost sight of the necessary foundation of love. In those moments, I focused on the mission, myself, or avoiding unpleasant consequences. The Bible's well-known chapter on love says, "Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth." I've found that when I act on what love is, instead of what love is not, my results are more significant.

I cannot emphasize enough that the story I've just shared with you would not have been possible without a culture rooted in love. If Gary hadn't believed I cared for him, he would have hung me out to dry and allowed me to make a decision he believed could be wrong. If the sailor who supported the XO hadn't felt safe speaking up and hadn't known his CO cared for him, he never would have risked the possible backlash.

Prior to me taking command, the USS *Texas* was the worst-performing ship in the squadron, but in just a year and a half, my team and I turned that record around, making the *Texas* the top ranked of the squadron's ten submarines. We also had the highest retention in the Pacific Fleet for two consecutive years and scored the best possible grade on a rigorous nuclear engineering exam. It wasn't due to my intelligence, tactical prowess, or charisma that USS *Texas* succeeded; instead, it was my ability to nurture strong connections based on familial love. I'll give concrete examples of how we accomplished this transformation. I'll also share how leaders from the Navy SEALs to the White House inspired their teams with unconditional love. Lastly, I will show you how this formula helped me, as executive director of quality and safety for one of the largest healthcare systems in the US, to transform cultures in healthcare.
