## Rose Show Rules \& Regulations

(See page 19 for additional special instructions for Division 14 - Floral Art only)
Entry show tags available at the Entry Clerk's Desk from 6:00-9:00 AM Saturday, June 22 /24. Exhibitors will be given a confidential exhibitor number when you pick up your tags. Put your exhibitor number, class number, and your name in the designated area of the entry tag BEFORE placing your entries on the show bench. Fold entry tag to conceal exhibitor's name \& number. Place elastic band over the base of the vase, to secure to your entry tag, or in front of bowls, baskets, boxes, etc.

1. The showroom will be open to exhibitors from 6:00 AM, Saturday June 22, 2023. A special area will be set aside for exhibitors to prepare their entries.
2. All amateur rose growers are eligible to exhibit their roses in this show. All roses exhibited must come from plants they have grown, which have been the exclusive property of the exhibitor for not less than three months prior to the show.
3. All entries in this show must have been grown outdoors by the exhibitor except where otherwise stated.
4. Any person may exhibit as many roses in each class as desired.
5. Bowl \& basket entries may be prepared in advance at home. Bowls/baskets will be available at the June 15, 2024 meeting, and also at the Pavilion the morning of the show.
Please return unused bowls or baskets to the show.
6. June 19, 2024 is the LAST date for entry tags \& registration to Floral Art Division14.
7. All entries must be placed by 9:45 AM Saturday, June 22, 2024
8. No exhibitor or visitor may enter the show area during the judging, except by special permission of the Show Chairperson.
9. No exhibit or award may be removed from the show area before the close of the show, June 23, 2024 at 3:00PM, except where permitted by the Show Chairperson.
10. An exhibitor will remain a novice until any one of the following is reached:
A. Three (3) years of exhibiting
B. Winning 3 blue ribbons
C. Winning the Novice Trophy
11. All vases, bowls, baskets, boxes, and entry cards will be supplied by the Fraser Pacific Rose Society for all exhibits and will remain the property of the Rose Society.
Containers must not be removed at the end of the show.
12. All entry tags must have been provided by the Fraser Pacific Rose Society. Any tags of different colour, size, etc. will automatically disqualify the entry. The tag must be filled out with the correct class number, variety \& Exhibitor's number which must be handwritten. The exhibitor's name (inside the tag) may be pre-printed; however, it must not appear in any
location other than the designated place on the tag. The tag must be folded so NO portion of exhibitor's name or number is visible. If the name of the exhibitor is visible, this is an automatic disqualification.
13. Each exhibitor agrees that the Fraser Pacific Rose Society and its officers and committees will not be held responsible for any loss or damage to any person or property.
14. The current American Rose Society's Handbook for Selecting Roses will be used for determining colour classification and where not shown in the handbook, Modern Roses 12 will be the final authority.
15. The decisions of the judges shall be final.
16. All roses exhibited become the property of the FPRS (except Division 14 Floral Art). Exhibitors who wish to take their roses at the end of the show must see the Show Chairperson or his/her appointed assistant. Proceeds from the sale of the roses help offset the cost of putting on the show.
17. Best in Show awards will be selected from single entry classes, except as stated in the Awards \& Trophies sections.

## 18. Definitions of Types of Blooms

Drawings \& descriptions courtesy of the Vancouver Rose Society

| Exhibition Bloom | One classic high-centred hybrid tea-type bloom with no side buds, $1 / 2$ to $3 / 4$ open, of <br> triangular appearance viewed from the side and with petals unfold symmetrically with a <br> circular outline looking down from the top. These blooms should NOT have side buds <br> growing out of them - they should be removed (see example under 'A Stem'). |
| :--- | :--- |
| The term is used mainly for hybrid teas and miniatures, however, most rose varieties are |  |
| capable of producing exhibition blooms. |  |
| Entries should be balanced and proportionate - if blooms are large, stems should be |  |
| long with lots of leaves. With smaller blooms, stems may be shorter, with fewer leaves. |  |



All roses may be exhibited with the stem holding a bloom still attached to a main cane.
All OGRs, Shrubs \& Austins may be shown with the stem-on-stem break showing above or hiding below the lip of the vase.

All other roses (hybrid tea, floribunda, grandiflora, mini) should be shown with the stem-on-stem break below the lip of the vase. If shown ABOVE the lip they will be downgraded in judging compared to a similar specimen in the class that does not have stem-on-stem showing.

| A Stem | This term refers to any ONE single stem or branch cut off a rose bush that ends in a <br> 'single bloom with or without side bids' (if allowed in each class) or 'multiple blooms/spray' - ie <br> 1 hybrid tea, 1 decorative bloom or multiple blooms from a spray of a floribunda, shrub, <br> OGR, etc. - all are referred to as a stem. |

| 1 bud + 1 bloom = 2 blooms, hence, would be disqualified in 'exhibition bloom' classes. |  |
| Acceptable ONLY in classes calling for a 'stem or bloom with side buds', ie shrubs, |  |

## Notice to Novice Exhibitors

There will be a table set up in the grooming area especially for Novice entrants with experienced exhibitors on hand to help you with your entries.

## Rules for Disqualification

Before Judging starts the Judges will try to have the Clerks place, any misclassed or mislabeled roses into their correct class. If this class has already been judged, under the new rules, this class will need to be re-judged rather than disqualifying those roses in all Open classes. Novice and Junior classes will not be disqualified. Misspelling of the Rose name will be corrected by the Judge, where found. If the rose name is unknown by exhibitor: please label it 'unknown'. If no name is present, this entry may be disqualified.
However, every effort should be made to properly name the roses for the benefit of the public.
A. *Presence of a foreign substance applied to foliage, stem, or bloom to improve the appearance of the specimen, (except in Division 14 - Floral Art).
Wedging material provided for stem support should be used below the lip of the vase.
B. *The appearance of exhibitor's name or label, visible in any location other than on the designated place on the inside of the closed entry tag.
C. *Not According to Schedule (NAS). Example: 3 stems shown in a class asking for 1 stem

Things that previously led to disqualifications (Stem on stem above vase lip, other than for OGRs or Austin/ English roses; side buds on HT specimens; bugs in rose; Q tips separating petals; leaf or stem abnormalities) will now be downgraded to penalizations to the degree of distraction. This change in rules is to encourage beginner to enter more roses.

Specimens exhibited will be judged according to the following point scores: Total =100\%
*Form $=25 \%$-shape of bloom, configuration of petals, degree of openness and its symmetry.
*Colour = $20 \%$-should be bright and display the full depth of the true seasonal colour of variety.
*Substance $=15 \%$-freshness of the bloom where petals are firm, crisp, have texture and no discolouration or loss of sheen: due to amount of moisture and starch in petals.
*Stem, Foliage $=20 \%$ - stems straight and strong with intact prickles, foliage clean and healthy.
*Balance \& Proportion = 10\% - combines the relative sizes of the bloom, stem and foliage into an aesthetically please exhibit.
*Size $=10 \%$ - the dimensions of the bloom: i.e. typical size for the variety and uniformity in size.

When judging Bowls \& Baskets, the judges are looking for balance and uniformity; each bloom separated from the other and preferably not touching. When the class calls for a mix of colours, many varieties and colours should be evident. The handle on baskets should allow for usage and should not be completely covered as to not be functional.

Note: Multiple $2^{\text {nd }} \& 3^{\text {rd }}$ ribbons will be awarded where applicable.

5. A common blue/green or a black background is provided.
6. Accessories are allowed in a design unless otherwise specified. The bases, if necessary, are included in the overall size requirements of a design.
7. A standard size arrangement space is 24 inches wide, 24 inches in depth and 36 inches high unless otherwise designated. It is suggested that you leave a couple of inches at the top and sides of the arrangement to fit in this allotted space.
8. A design consists of fresh flowers and foliage only. As this is a rose show, roses must be the dominant flower interest in all designs. Filler flowers are permitted. Roses need not be grown outdoors (purchased floral products may be used in Floral Art only) unless otherwise designated.
9. Artificial flowers and foliage are NOT permitted.
10. No food is allowed in Floral Art except for fruit and vegetables, which if cut, must be sealed.
11. No exhibit may be removed from the show room until the end of the Rose Show on Sunday June 25, 2023 at 3 PM, without the permission of the Rose Show Chairperson.

Open Class - is open to anyone.
Amateur Class - is open to anyone not engaged in the florist trade. An amateur must not have received remuneration as an instructor of floral design or otherwise received money for providing floral designs.

Novice Class - is open to anyone who has not won more than three first place awards, or won any Best in Show Trophy, at any structured floral design show(s).

One may enter classes above eligibility, but not below eligibility.
