Alcohol Use Disorder

Alcohol use disorder (AUD) is a chronic medical condition characterized by impaired control of alcohol use leading to adverse health, social, psychological and life consequences.

In 2021, **29.5 million** people aged 12 and older had AUD. However,

received any treatment for their alcohol use.



ONLY 2%

received medication to treat their alcohol use.
