FINLAND'S INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATION

At the Finnish Center, FCA celebrated Finland's 107th Independence Day on December 7, 2024. FinnFolk, our resident band, performed traditional Finnish music during the cocktail hour.

The program began with a flag ceremony and the American and Finnish national anthems, with Roy Takakura and Matias Pantsar serving as flag bearers. Marilyn Metsa-Clark delivered the welcoming speech and introduced the performers, led by Katri Ervamaa. After a delicious dinner, Marilyn welcomed our new Honorary Consul for Finland for lower peninsula of Michigan, Kevin Nurmi, who extended greetings from Finland. She also introduced our keynote speaker, Tommy Flanagan, Executive Director of the Finlandia Foundation National.

Tommy began by thanking the FCA members for the important and meaningful gift of Tapiola, completed in 2024. He explained that the gift played a crucial role in saving Finnish-American immigration history and archives. Tommy delivered a captivating speech titled *Finland Today: From Legacy to Future*, which explored various aspects of Finnish history, culture, and traditions.

A moving performance of *Finlandia* by Jean Sibelius followed, featuring Katri Ervamaa (cello), Naki Sung-Kripfangs (piano), Don Reinholm (accordion), and Jennifer Goltz-Taylor (voice).

The musicians were joined by a group of Katri's University of Michigan students to perform Finnish tangos. This lively segment aimed to inspire attendees to dance, with all pieces composed by Finnish artists dating back from the 1930's to the 1970's.

A heartfelt thank you goes out to all the volunteers who made the event successful—special thanks to Kathryn Hill and Katri Ervamaa for their invaluable contributions to the program.




RYIJY WALL HANGINGS BACK ON DISPLAY

NOVI CONCERT BAND CHRISTMAS CONCERT

Twice a year we have a very entertaining program here in the Finnish Center banquet hall. The local Novi Concert Band presents concerts to a crowd of FCA members and guests. On Friday December 13, after a buffet meal prepared by Michael's Touch of Class, about forty musicians took out their flutes, clarinets, saxophones, trumpets, trombones, and tubas and provided a fine band performance.

The band is not sponsored by the local school music programs, but by the Novi Parks, Recreation, and Cultural Services. The group includes many fine local musicians, under the direction of Scott Cramer.

The Novi Concert Band performs multiple times every year at indoor and outdoor locations in the Novi area. The Finnish Center has hosted them for many years, perhaps 50! The selections for the latest concert included the Finnish and American national anthems, a special piece entitled "Finnish Rhapsody", followed by songs of the season: "Jingle Bells", "Carol of the Drum", "Away in a Manger", and others, all arranged for concert bands. During one particular song, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas", Director Cramer started by sitting in an easy chair and reading the story of the Grinch, much to the delight of the audience and the band members.

If you have never attended one of these performances at the FCA, you should try it. You'll get a buffet meal at the regular price and the band concert is free. Set your calendars for Friday, June 6, for the Band's next visit.







"THE GIFT OF MUSIC"

Presented by the Finnish-American Singers of Michigan

As they always do at this time of year, the FASM's concert theme was Christmas. The 15-member choir is directed by Alex Cave, with beautiful piano and kantele accompaniment by Hope McGookey. A variety of types of music was shared--sacred, secular, traditional, and humorous—by the choir as a whole, in small groups, and as solos—in Finnish, Swedish, German and English. This was a delightful afternoon of combined voices and instruments.

Director Alex Cave provided interesting background information about each piece. Jukka Kuoppamaki's "Sininen ja Valkoinen," one of the most popular songs in Finland, is often used in karaoke sessions in Finland. "Something Told the Wild Geese," by Sherri Porterfield, is a poem about the changing of the seasons. The Finnish folksong "Kun joulu valkeneepi," with solo by alto Nancy Jacobs, was originally a German folk tune. Alex participates in an Ohio choral music singing group three times a year, and brought this arrangement of "O Holy Night" by Craig Courtney to the choir. Soprano Cortney Szpanelewski did the solo on this familiar piece. Bass Paul Rajala performed a solo on Swedish verse of "Silent Night," and the audience was invited to sing along in English, which many people enjoyed doing. Aimo Huttunen's "Taas syttyvät kynttilät" (Candles Are Lit Again), with tenor Katy Koskela doing the solo, describes the Finnish custom of placing lighted candles in their windows at night during the Christmas season.

"I Want a Hippopotamus for Christmas", arranged by Jill Gallina, and "The Man With the Bag"—obviously Santa Claus—were humorous songs, and they were thoroughly enjoyed by the audience.

Director Cave wanted the audience to know that one doesn't have to be Finnish to sing in the choir, and invited folks to join if they love to sing. Rehearsals begin again in the new year, on Monday nights.

Audience members were also invited to sing along on the final piece, Sibelius' magnificent "Finlandia-hymni."

There was ample time to visit and congratulate the singers for a superb concert during the after-concert coffee hour, during which delicious cookies and prune tarts were available with coffee and lemonade.

If you missed this delightful concert, watch for the announcement of the Singers' spring concert—you'll hear some musical surprises and some time-tested standards, and you'll enjoy each one!



TWENTY-FIVE POPULAR FINNISH BOY'S NAMES OF FINNISH ORIGIN

(Things I found while looking for something else by Paul Rajala)

- **25. Arvo** comes from the Finnish word *arvo*, which means "value" or "worth." Similar-sounding names: Arvid, Aaro, Alvo, Ari, Arto, Armas, Arne, Arland, Arwin, and Ardan.
- **24. Ismo** is a Finnish form of the name *Ismael*, which originates from Hebrew, meaning "God will hear." Similar-sounding names: Esko, Immo, Iiro, Isko, Iisakki, Iivo, Ilo, Ingo, Ilmo, and Enno.
- **23. Jaakko** is the Finnish form of *Jacob*, which comes from the Hebrew name *Yaakov*, meaning "supplanter" or "one who follows." Similar-sounding names: Jarkko, Jukka, Jari, Jalo, Joakim, Jaap, Jakob, Jaco, Jake, and Janne.
- **22. Eetu** is the Finnish diminutive form of *Edvard*, derived from Old English elements meaning "wealth" and "guardian." Similar-sounding names: Aatu, Eino, Eeli, Eppu, Elmo, Eero, Eerik, Edi, Enok, and Eli.
- **21. Juhani** is a Finnish variant of *Johannes*, which is derived from the Hebrew *Yochanan*, meaning "God is gracious." Similar-sounding names: Juho, Juha, Jussi, Janne, Jorma, Jaakko, Jonne, Juuso, Joonas, and Jukka.
- **20. Jussi** is a Finnish diminutive form of *Juhani* or *Johannes*, meaning "God is gracious." Similar-sounding names: Juho, Jukka, Jesse, Jami, Jorma, Joel, Jari, Joni, Janne, and Joonas.
- 19. Kevat means "spring" in Finnish, referring to the season of renewal and growth. Similar-sounding names: Keijo, Kauri, Kaapo, Kai, Kimo, Kuutti, Kosti, Kosti, Kari, and Kauko.
- **18. Mustanen** is derived from the Finnish word *musta*, meaning "black," often used as a surname referring to dark colors or features. Similar-sounding names: Maunu, Miska, Mielikki, Mauri, Mertsi, Mikko, Miro, Markus, Moisio, and Manni.
- **17. Aapeli** is derived from the Hebrew name *Abel*, meaning "breath" or "vapor." Similar-sounding names: Aapo, Aarne, Akseli, Aatos, Altti, Atte, Anssi, Arto, Armas, and Arvi.
