



Building raised beds - this article has a great set of instructions, also includes why it's good to build raised beds

Materials and methods to fill raised beds (for less money) – we discussed the <u>hugelkultur method</u>, which uses logs as a base, then sticks, mulch, grass clippings or leaves, and finally soil. A couple of cheap/free sources of wood chips <u>chipdrop.com</u> and local chip piles (Shaker Lakes and Forest Hills are 2 places with known wood chip piles you can take from.

Growing food with little space – so much food will grow happily in containers, often the limit is if they're getting enough nutrients and water. Many common veggies have container-friendly varieties. For people with access to a small garden plot, square foot gardening may work well (this link includes info about companion planting – kind of like plants that are besties).

<u>Hand pollination</u> – can be used outside, but we mostly talked about it as a possibility for trying to grow food indoors, you'll need to hand pollinate since you won't really have bugs to do it for you!




So many ways to start seed

- Special seed starting trays
- Pods (least efficient/sustainable)
- Soil blocking
- Toilet paper rolls
- Egg cartons
- Newspaper
- Direct sow

extras from our conversation!

We had conversations about:

how deep to plant seeds – usually related to how large the seeds are, bigger seeds likely need to be planted deeper, find this info on your seed packet!

how many seeds per square in your tray or seed starting container – if your seed is fresh (the seed packet will say "packaged for 2025" or current year) usually I'll plant seeds roughly an inch apart – often 2 per cell of a tray. If your seed is older, can add more because it's likely that not all of the seeds will sprout. try not to put in more than this, you'll need to separate your seedlings and their roots will be delicate!

if you aren't using a conventional seed tray, make sure to poke holes in the bottom of your container, they need

drainage!

Taking care of babies



Spray/mist 1-2 times a day, also will need to water about once a day

Probably need a lot of light

If you have a very sunny window (direct sunlight for at least 6 hours a day), you can get away without needing a grow light. Grow bulbs are fairly affordable (I have these) or you could buy this and put it in something like a desk lamp

Some seedlings need heat too!

Tomatoes and peppers really need a heat mat, something like this

Need a sheltered location – protection from direct sunlight and wind.

Examples: a porch, fire escape, random courtyard, even on the ground behind bushes/trees

Aftercare

Fertilizers
Staking/cages

Pruning
