

# **SOUTH SIDE HEALTH HOME**

#### Introduction

In 2019, the Chicago Department of Public Health modified the funding structure for HIV prevention and care, creating a network-based resource community for people affected by HIV (population-centered health homes, PCHH). The University of Chicago's HIV programs joined together to create the South Side Health Home (S2H2). Each group in S2H2 (HIV-PACT, CCHE,



and Care2Prevent- UCM's pediatric HIV center) bring their unique areas of expertise to create a care and prevention system that ensures that all community members, regardless of status, are receiving the medical, social and structural support they deserve. As part of S2H2, University of Chicago medical providers provided care to 644 individuals living with HIV in 2024. Of the 644 people living with HIV, 88% are currently retained in care (seen in the last six months, a 29% increase from 2023), and 89% are virally suppressed (VL<200). Additionally, Care2Prevent provided HIV care to 106 unique individuals in 2024. Our additional S2H2 physicians providing care for an additional 938 clients at local federally qualified health centers including Howard Brown Health Clinic, Friend Health Center, and Chicago Family Health Clinic.

#### Care2Prevent

Care2Prevent (C2P) contributes to the mission of S2H2 by focusing on pediatric, adolescent, and young adult populations who possess unique needs in terms of sexual and reproductive health interventions. In addition to extensive wraparound services with a client engagement specialist and in-clinic peer support, our providers are specially trained in HIV/STI treatment and prevention for the youngest members of our community.

#### **HIV-PACT**

HIV-PACT (Prevention and Care Team), is part of the S2H2 population Centered Health Home for the University of Chicago. HIV-PACT provides comprehensive HIV prevention and care support at The University of Chicago's Medical Campus. The HIV-PACT team is staffed with members from pharmacy, social work, nursing, and health education who provide care coordination for individuals living with HIV and outreach to community members who are hospitalized, lost to follow-up, and/or newly diagnosed with HIV. The PACT team leads efforts in the Adult and COMER Emergency department to routinely screen people for HIV and HCV, and link those who screen positive to care, as well as provide comprehensive STI follow-up in the Sexual Wellness Clinic.

## The Village

The Village provides accessible HIV testing and linkage to care, working closely with other S2H2 partners to ensure seamless connections to treatment and support. With a focus on low-barrier services, it offers resources like transportation, housing, mental health support, and financial assistance to remove obstacles to care. By addressing social and emotional barriers, The Village helps community members stay engaged in treatment, prioritize their health, and maintain long-term well-being in the fight against HIV.



# The Chicago Center for HIV Elimination (CCHE) Service Arms Overview

There are two distinct arms of CCHE: HIV Prevention and Care Team (HIV-PACT), providing clinical services and research in the hospital and Adult Infectious Disease section, and The Village, CCHE's off-campus community service and research site.

At CCHE, our two arms of service have worked diligently to create a streamlined workflow that ensures seamless support for our shared clients across both locations. By meeting community members in the Emergency



Department during a medical crisis, we provide immediate intervention and support. Our efforts also focus on increasing access to essential medical care and prescribed medications. Through collaborative case management, we guarantee wraparound care, coordinating resources and services to address all aspects of their well-being and ensure ongoing support throughout their journey.

In 2024, CCHE (HIV-PACT and The Village) served a combined **2,113 unique clients with 7,110 encounters.** Check out our impact below!

## HIV Prevention & Care Team (HIV-PACT)

HIV-PACT provided supported services to 1,079 unique clients, a 67.5% increase since 2023, with 2,937 encounters in 2024. Majority of participants (n=740) received non-medical case management, offering care coordination, health education, mental health support, referrals, and more. Another 644 individuals received early intervention services, which are more targeted support offerings for individuals newly diagnosed with HIV or re-engaging with HIV care. The remaining 100 participants were a part of outreach efforts to re-engage individuals in care.

## The Village

In 2024, The Village served 1,034 unique clients, marking a 17% increase from 2023. These clients had 4,173 encounters at the Village, reflecting a 56% rise from 2023. Clients visited CCHE on an average of 11 times throughout the year, ranging from 1-86 visits per client. Resource counseling (n=1,600), mental health services (n=1,225) and research (n=1,091) were the most requested services in 2024. Testing, outreach events, and substance use resources (namely safer use kits and referrals for treatment) were also among services rendered (n=934, n=156, and n=59, respectively).

## **HIV-PACT & The Village: Supportive Services**

The Supportive Services team, which is comprised of social workers, case managers, and mental health counselors, across both programs (HIV-PACT & The Village) work in partnership to provide a variety of services to meet the community's unique needs. The Center believes that this type of programming is integral to the mission of eliminating new HIV transmission events by 2041.

Community members who touch any S2H2 provider are eligible to receive Supportive Services offerings at The Village, located off-campus on 55th and Lake Park.

#### The Village: Supportive Services

In 2024, The Village Supportive Services team served 316 unique clients at The Village, with 57 individuals receiving therapy services and 259 receiving case management. The team provided over \$18,110 in resources to community members in 2024; The most frequently provided supports include gift cards for food and other necessities, transportation support (Lyfts) to appointments and interviews, and bus cards for other transportation needs.

There has been a significant increase in the number of clients who were street based and unstably housed since 2023; With the hopes of better supporting those clients, the program added microwavable food and other snacks for clients who drop in, and 7-day bus passes for safer sleep/transportation to the service offerings. In 2024, every client who came to The Village for research, services or use of the drop in space received a snack pack. Our goal for 2025 is to ensure the snacks we deliver are substantial enough to curb hunger pains and offer nutritional options.

## **HIV-PACT: Supportive Services**

In 2024, HIV-PACT delivered non-medical case management services to 740 unique community members, with a total of 1,709 encounters. Notably, PACT distributed \$9,110 in grocery store gift cards to enhance food security for clients. Additionally, PACT provided 270 one-day bus passes to eliminate transportation barriers, ensuring continued access to treatment and services. These efforts reflect PACT's commitment to addressing the social determinants of health and ensuring that clients have the resources they need to maintain consistent care.

## HIV-PACT: Sexual Wellness Clinic (SWC)

In February 2025, the HIV-PACT team celebrated the 6th year of the Sexual Wellness Clinic (SWC), a collaboration with the Emergency Department to expand sexual health services and HIV prevention efforts to those presenting to the Emergency Department (ED). Since inception, the SWC has provided wholistic and comprehensive care to nearly 700 individuals who were tested under the routine syphilis screening program or presented to the ED for sexual health concerns.

# HIV-PACT & The Village: Supportive Services

#### The Village: Front Desk Special Projects

In 2024, the team noted that there was an increase in the number of community members. accessing our space to sleep, stay cool/warm, and hang out when awaiting services and research offerings. With the hopes of better supporting those clients, the CCHE Admin Team spearheaded several community-centered services, including:

- 1. Enhanced Snack Packs: 200 snack packs filled with 16 items and over 60 grams of protein, packaged in a reusable bag, distributed during the holiday season.
- 2. Stay Warm Kits: 200 kits containing warming and wellness resources, designed to bring hugs and joy to our community members, acknowledging the challenges of the holiday season.
- 3. Fidget Library: A variety of fidget toys made available to help ease tension and anxiety for our community members.
- 4. Reusable Earplugs & Noise-Canceling Headphones: Offered take-home earplugs and over-ear noise-canceling headphones for those feeling overstimulated.
- 5. Día de Muertos altar: The Admin team created an ofrenda (altar) for staff and clients to honor those we have lost by welcoming their spirits back for a brief reunion through offerings and personal mementos.

These initiatives reflect our **commitment** to supporting the wellbeing of our community throughout the year.

# The Village: Community-Based Testing

The Village offers community-based, low-barrier, free HIV and STI testing. Once results are processed, the Testing Team provides results notification, linkage to care and works with our Supportive Services team at The Village and HIV-PACT to support retention in care efforts. In 2024, The Village Testing Team performed nearly 2,104 HIV and STI tests, a 250% increase from 2023. Most notably, positive syphilis results increased by 39% and active syphilis infections that are eligible for treatments increased by 54% in 2024 compared to 2023.

#### **HIV-PACT: ED-Based Testing**

The University of Chicago Medicine (UCM) continues to be the lead organization for HIV screening in healthcare settings (also known as Expanded HIV Testing and Linkage to Care, or xLTC), in partnership with 13 hospitals and federally qualified health centers on the South and West sides of Chicago. In 2024, University of Chicago Medicine performed 39,343 HIV tests (up 6% from 2023) and identified 39 individuals newly diagnosed with HIV. Dr. Kimberly Stanford, MD, MPH, Director of Emergency Department (ED) HIV/STI Testing, has worked closely with the HIV-PACT team to increase routine HIV and STI screening in the ED. In addition to routine HCV tests, the UCM ED also made syphilis screening available in the ED in 2024 and found 227 active infections that were eligible for treatment. HIV-PACT also provides linkage to care services for people diagnosed with Hepatitis C who are eligible for treatment.

## Outreach & Partnerships

Meaningful community engagement is a cornerstone of the work at CCHE. Since its inception, CCHE has built thoughtful partnerships with South and West side organizations and stakeholders. Here are some highlights of our 2024 outreach efforts:

- Community Advisory Board: To ensure community support and relevance, CCHE worked to relaunch the Center's Community Advisory Board (CAB). The CAB will now support S2H2 partnerships: Care2Prevent, HIV-PACT and The Village. The CAB application process is being finalized and will launch in 2025.
- AIDS Run/Walk 2024: CCHE raised \$15,570
  for service programming. As a community
  direct partner, 90% of funds raised were
  returned to CCHE to support 2025
  programming. Typically, these funds are
  supporting annual events, client emergency
  requests and other programming needs.
- Digital outreach efforts: CCHE revamped all social media in 2023 and have quickly (re)built our following in 2024, most notably, our instagram followers increased by 138%. We hope to continue our reach in 2025- follow us!

In 2024, CCHE supported several external events through our sponsorship efforts, including:

- Space support: The Village's community space is offered to our community partners for events, meetings and community-centered programming. In 2024, we worked with five community partners to establish regular use of our space:
  - Adodi, a brotherhood organization for same-gender-loving men of African descent)
  - People Advocating Change (PAC), a monthly group for Black men
  - Black Alphabet, an organization prioritizing the visibility of Black LGBTQ+ artists
  - Ch@sity's, a live stream show forBlack sexual and gender diverse individuals
  - Santa Lucia Food Safety Training and Consulting, LLC, an organization offering food safety certification training to community members. If referred by CCHE, the fee is waived
- Community education offerings: CCHE provided HIV education to Phoenix Recovery Support Services team and residents, totaling 60 attendees! We hope to expand our educational offerings in 2025.

In June of 2024, CCHE was awarded a diversity grant through the Office of the Provost to host a Juneteenth event for the community we serve. *Liberating Love: A Juneteenth Celebration of Black Sexual Health* was our first annual Juneteenth event at The Village. We had about 15 participants

and aim to reach at least 30 participants in 2025!





## My Community, My Voice

In June of 2024 the CCHE Research Department hosted its first research dissemination event titled, *My Community*, *My Voice*. The intent of this event was so share the work being done at CCHE with community; engage with the community in which we serve; leverage networking opportunities; and facilitate study recruitment. This was the first event CCHE has hosted of this nature and was set to address feedback we received from research participants wanting to learn more about the impact of their involvement within the Center's research projects.

## World AIDS Day Event

CCHE proudly hosted our inaugural Center-wide World AIDS Day event in December 2024, marking a significant milestone for our organization. With over 100 attendees, it was our largest and most impactful event of the year!

#### Care2Prevent

Care2Prevent (C2P), the University of Chicago's Pediatric and Adolescent HIV Program, is part of the S2H2 Population Centered Health Home for the University of Chicago. C2P champions stability and upholds dignity through client-focused support, enabling self-directed progress within the continuum of HIV care. By prioritizing

autonomy and the provision of innovative services, C2P aims to reshape and elevate the landscape of HIV care provision for individuals and families on Chicago's South Side.

Over the last year, our outreach and prevention team has increased its presence in South Side communities both with the mobile medical unit, offering routine HIV/STI testing and safer sex and harm reduction supplies, as well as by engaging adolescents at Excel Academies located in the Roseland, South Shore, and West Garfield Park neighborhoods. In addition, we have sought new and continued partnerships with community-based organizations to include Deborah's Place, Sanctuary Place, Covenant House of IL, and Southwest Chicago Homeless Services to ensure routine testing services are accessible to unhoused populations. Our team has created a Wind Down support group for youth with HIV, is collaborating with Gender Productions for a quarterly gender-bending and affirming open mic night with HIV/STI testing, as well as spearheading our own events in South Side neighborhoods to bring health, employment, and other resources to our patients, clients, and communities.

## Service Spotlight: BIA

In 2021, ViiV Healthcare's Amp Grant funded CCHE's Black Incubator & Accelerator (BIA) project, a micro-granting and capacity-building program designed to strengthen grassroots HIV service efforts on the South and West sides of Chicago. BIA aims to: 1) build organizational resilience and programmatic strength among South and West BSGD-led organizations, 2) cultivate Black local leadership, and 3) foster a healthy ecosystem of Black-led HIV service organizations that promote innovation, the development of culturally relevant programs, and collaboration across agencies. These objectives are achieved through individualized needs assessments, tailored capacity building, seed funding, access to University of Chicago resources, and peer networking, among other strategies.

From 2021 to 2024, BIA piloted its project, partnering with 4 organizations in Year 1, 12 in Year 2, and 21 in Year 3, with a total of 23 organizations engaged in the program over the three year project periods.

Key accomplishments from the 2021-2024 cycle include the submission and successful securing of 7 501(c)(3) applications, the acquisition of new fiscal agents by 2 organizations, and the establishment of new spaces for 12 organizations. Additionally, 32 new grants were funded, resulting in \$985,500 in leveraged funding. The cohort also formed 269 new partnerships, further strengthening the collective impact of the initiative.

BIA has been re-funded through Viiv Healthcare's Amp Grant for another three-year cycle and currently has 13 organizations in the 2025 cohort. #### Third Coast Center for AIDS Research

The Third Coast Center for AIDS Research (TC-CFAR) mission is to catalyze cross-institutional and cross-disciplinary HIV research collaborations with a broad scope and major impact on the HIV epidemic in Chicago. The University of Chicago, and specifically the Chicago Center for HIV Elimination, is a trusted partner within TC-CFAR alongside Northwestern University. One of CCHE's roles within TC-CFAR is to support the dissemination of HIV research and engagement between community members and investigators through Community Dissemination Awards (CDA).

Through this mechanism, the TC-CFAR funded 11 organizations totaling \$19,000 in 2024. We are the extremely honored to work side by side with our community dissemination awardees, who support the community in providing safe and welcoming spaces, vital resources, and access to research outcomes. ## **BIOSTATS**

## **Biostatistics and Computational Modeling**

The Biostatistics and Computational Modeling team conducts innovative research using simulation and novel statistical approaches, with the goal of producing rigorous evidence to support CCHE. Our team's expertise includes statistics, epidemiology, computational modeling, and qualitative, quantitative, and mixed methods research. We provide support for service provision as well as biobehavioral and clinical research projects, including observational cohort studies, randomized controlled trials, and mathematical modeling.

In 2024, we transitioned into a recharge for faculty system investigators inside and outside CCHE utilize to **Biostatistics** services. We assist at each stage of the research process, including proposal development, study design, sample size and power calculations, survey and qualitative protocol development, data linkage harmonization, data management and quality assurance, statistical and qualitative analyses. #### Study Design

## Faculty Spotlight: Jack Flores, MD

John Flores (or as he likes to go by, "Jack") is in his final year of a four year infectious diseases (ID) fellowship at University of Chicago, where he is receiving a combined training in both adult and pediatric ID training. While clinically Jack enjoys treating all infectious diseases among all ages, his research interests include topics related to HIV, HIV prevention, and other Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) with a particular focus on the adolescent/young adult & maternal-fetal dyad populations. He is also very passionate about health care advocacy, particularly when it comes to LBGTQ+ populations, pediatrics, and optimizing optimal health care for birthing/pregnant individuals. Jack has had the honor and privilege to work with many of the faculty attending physicians through CCHE, including his primary mentor Dr. John Schneider, who has guided the majority of his research projects over the last four years. Under the guidance of Dr. Schneider, Jack has



completed multiple projects including investigating barriers to health care for priority Latinx LGBTQ+ individuals throughout the Chicagoland area, the geospatial impact of violent crime on HIV related outcomes among Sexual Minority individuals in Chicago, and a large population based study investigating the intersection of stigma and methamphetamine use throughout the USA.

Jack's primary research though has been investigating factors related to the rise of congenital syphilis, the transmission of the STI syphilis from a pregnant individual to their infant. His most recent work involved an in depth qualitative study interviewing prenatal providers, and individuals who delivered infants with congenital syphilis, to gather their perspectives on the disease process and attempt to identify barriers to diagnosis and treatment of syphilis before the infant could be born with disease. In addition to Dr. Schneider, Jack was able to work closely on this project with fellow CCHE team members Dr. Jessica Ridgway, Jackson Montgomery, Ellen Almirol, and Alicia Dawdani. As a team they were able to identify various factors associated with the rise of congenital syphilis including transportation limitations of patients, clinical appointment burden, stigma, poor communication between providers & their patients, and other factors that may be targets for future interventions. Jack plans on continuing his career this summer at University of Chicago as a Clinical Instructor, and looks forward to continuing to collaborate with the CCHE on various projects related to HIV and other STIs. His ultimate goal, under the guidance of CCHE providers Dr. John Schneider and Dr. Mai Pho, is to receive extramural funding to support a project where community health workers may engage with birthing individuals and their social networks to reduce the incidence of HIV and other STIs.






## Faculty Spotlight: Harita Shah, MD

Dr. Harita Shah, Assistant Professor in Internal Medicine and Pediatrics, is a primary care physician and researcher who focuses on community-engaged interventions to improve access to HIV prevention. Dr. Shah has mainly focused on addressing unmet HIV prevention needs in Latino communities, including for LGBTQ+ individuals and for Spanish-speaking immigrants. Dr. Shah's work has been informed by barriers her primary care patients faced in accessing preventive care and through partnerships with community based organizations.





PrEPárate: A Social Marketing Campaign to Promote PrEP

Dr. Shah was awarded an Ending the HIV Epidemic Supplement Award and a CTSA KL2 Award to develop, pilot test, and evaluate a social marketing campaign to promote PrEP among Latino sexual and gender minority individuals. Dr. Shah worked partnership with the Chicago Queer Latine (CQL) Collaborative, a group of local Latino leaders representing HIVfocused community-based organizations. Based on formative input from the CQL Collaborative and community members, the team created a social marketing campaign called PrEPárate, meaning "be PrEPared" in Spanish. The PrEPárate campaign included culturally tailored materials, created by local Latino artists and designers, to effectively communicate information about PrEP among Latino audiences. Campaign messages were distributed on social media and through in person venues across Chicagoland. A mixed methods evaluation showed that exposure to the PrEPárate campaign was significantly associated with increased PrEP awareness and PrEP use. Qualitative interviews with community members showed that the colorful logos and featuring of local recognizable influencers from the community

were key to success. Qualitative interviews with community partners showed they had interest in continuing this work and expanding reach to Latino youth and Spanish-speaking immigrant populations.

In 2024, Dr. Shah was awarded a K23 Award from the National Institute of Mental Health to build on this work. Under the mentorship of Dr. John Schneider, Dr. Shah will build skills in social network analysis to understand how social networks shape PrEP use among Latino youth and young adults, with dedicated recruitment of immigrant individuals. These findings will inform a multilevel intervention that builds on the PrEPárate campaign with a peer-navigation component.
