ONE IN FIVE VOTERS SMOKE

- There are 800,000 smokers in Ireland, 20% of the electorate.
- Since 2004 smokers have been subjected to a series of measures including the smoking ban, the tobacco display ban, graphic health warnings and punitive taxation.
- Smokers contributed nearly €984 million to the Exchequer last year, far more than they allegedly cost the health service. They deserve better from our elected representatives.



IRELAND'S SECOND CLASS CITIZENS

- Ireland is one of the most regulated countries in the world in which to smoke. Smokers have generally accepted the many restrictions with good grace but enough is enough.
- By denying smokers the ability to smoke in comfortable, designated smoking rooms and extending the smoking ban to some outdoor areas, policy makers are deliberately ostracising smokers from the community.
- Government is punishing smokers unfairly. Adults who choose to smoke have every right to do so without being under constant attack from policy makers.

PRICING SMOKERS OUT OF THE MARKET

- The massive increase in tobacco taxation over the last five years has been a disproportionate attack on Ireland's smokers.
- Many smokers come from lower socio-economic backgrounds meaning those who earn the least have been hit hardest by tax increases.
- Cigarette prices have risen by 16% in recent years driving people who can't afford to pay excessive prices





FUNDING CRIMINAL GANGS

- Ireland has some of the most expensive cigarettes in the world, but they can be bought for as little as €4.50 a pack on the black market.
- Criminals don't respect age restrictions. They will happily sell cigarettes to children.
- Illegal cigarettes cost taxpayers between €250m and €600m every year and criminals use the profits to fund further illegal activity.

FOCUS ON WHAT WORKS

 Instead of targeting adults who choose to smoke, the next government should focus on strategies that are proven to reduce youth smoking rates.

- Reduce the punitive tax on tobacco and stop encouraging illicit trade.
